Please consider helping, even in a small way, with **preparations for the Show**: **setting up tents and stalls, tidying common areas, putting up notices**, etc., as well as **manning the stalls on the day**.

It can be a lot of fun and you meet your fellow plot holders! We will be putting up a list of jobs that you can sign up for nearer to the time of the Show.

#### WHAT CAN YOU ENTER?

#### Before the Day of the Show:

**Potato Competition:** Prize is for the highest combined weight of potatoes from 3 tubers which are distributed in late March/early April from the Trading Shed (50p for 3 potatoes). You need to register your name and plot when collecting. Tubers will be dug up approximately one week before the Show by three committee members and weighed. Please mark the growing area CLEARLY.

Best Plots: Trophies will be given for :

\*Best half plot \*Best full plot \*Best newcomer's half plot \*Best Newcomers Full plot

All plot holders are eligible **except** winners in the previous year. Plots will be judged about **two weeks** before the Show.

#### Gardener of the Year:

Nominations should be submitted to the Chairman by 12<sup>th</sup> August . (Note: you may not submit yourself.)

Raffle: Don't forget to buy a Raffle ticket from the Trading Shed (from August).

#### The Allotment Show:

See the various categories and classes in **fruit**, **vegetables**, **flowers**, **produce and baked goods** you can enter below, along with the rules of entry.

### **REGULATIONS FOR EXHIBITORS**

# Entries are welcome from all members of GCAA. Make sure you have first paid your GCAA subscription (£5).

**1.** All exhibits should be grown by the exhibitor in their own allotment or garden for at least eight weeks before the Show. Anyone attempting to gain prizes by unfair means shall forfeit all prizes awarded to him/her. The Committee will refuse further entries from that person. Young people may enter in the Novice/Young People's Section, but not in the adult section. Novices may enter in the Novice/Young People's Section and/or the adult section

**2.** All exhibits should be grouped under the correct class and should not be moved after staging is complete. Each exhibit should be accompanied by a card bearing the Class and Exhibitor numbers, provided by the Entries desk.

**3.** No competitor shall be allowed to stage more than one exhibit for any one class unless otherwise stated.

**4.** Proxy entries will be accepted on receipt of a letter to the Show organisers from the exhibitor confirming that they have grown the items on their allotment.

**5.** The decision of the Judges is final. The Committee, in consultation with the Judges, may withhold any prize in any Class at their discretion. The GCAA reserves the right to consult with the judge in respect to possible changes or amendments. Protests must be made by 5.00 pm on Show Day to be adjudicated later by the Show Committee.

6. Completed entry forms should be returned to the Entries desk by 11.15 am on Show Day.

**7.** All exhibits should be staged between 2.00pm and 5.00pm on the day before the Show **or** between 8.30 am and 11.15 am on Show Day. Judging will commence at 11.30. **Exhibitors must leave the tent by 11.15 am.** 

**8.** Points will be awarded as follows: 1st Prize 4 points, 2nd Prize 3 points, 3rd Prize 2 points, Highly Commended 1 point.

**9.** All exhibits of fruit and vegetables should be displayed on plates (paper included) **which exhibitors should provide.** 

**10.** All ordinary care will be taken of exhibits but the Association is unable to accept responsibility for loss or damage.

**11.** Exhibitors will be allowed to recover their exhibits at the time specified in the Show Timetable. Exhibitors wishing to keep items should mark entry cards with a star sticker available from the entries desk.

12. Challenge Cups must be returned, cleaned and polished, to the Trading Shed or Show Secretary at least 14 days before the Show

**13. Best Plots** will be judged by three Committee members at a convenient time before the show.

#### **AWARDS**

Bonner Memorial Trophy: awarded to member with best kept full plot GCAA Best Kept Half Plot: Trophy awarded to member with best kept half plot GCAA New Members Best Kept Half Plot: Trophy awarded to new gardener with best kept or most improved half plot

GCAA Best New Member's Best Kept Full Plot: Trophy awarded to the new gardener with the best kept or most improved full plot

Points will be awarded based on the following criteria:

Cultivation & neatness: 30 Flowers: variety: 10 Vegetables: variety: 25 Fruit: variety: 10 Overall quality: 10 Compost bin: 5 Biodiversity (e.g. rainwater butts, nesting boxes): 10 **Total possible points: 100** 

**Gardener of the Year Award: The Rose Hacker Cup** is awarded annually to a member of the Association "who has shown good gardening practices over a number of years". The winner is chosen by the Committee based on nominations from the membership as a whole. Serving committee members are not eligible.

# **HINTS FOR EXHIBITORS**

#### How to impress the Judge and win more points!

- BEANS, RUNNER OR DWARF: Pods long, straight, clear, even, fleshy and brittle, with stalks.
- BEETROOT: Uniform size, deep, not flat, small tap roots, well coloured, 3" (7.5cm) stem, tied.
- CABBAGE: Of medium size, hearts firm, well-formed leaves, clean with 4" (10cm) of stem.

CARROTS: Of medium size according to variety, good and even form, skin clear, good, bright colour, no side shoots, with 3" (7.5cm) stalk.

CAULIFLOWER: Medium size, firm, rounded, free from stain or frothiness, white and clean with 4" stem.

MARROWS: Of medium size, approximately 9" (23cm) long and 3" (7.5cm) diameter.

- ONIONS: Skin clear, rounded or globular, the neck tied with raffia, solid shape, no splits or over skinning.
- PEAS: Pods large well filled, of good deep green colour, with bloom, free from rust, of fair size and clean.
- POTATOES: Medium size, free from disease, eyes few and shallow, skin clear, fresh and clean.

SHALLOTS: Uniform in size, firm and bright.

TOMATOES: Medium size, skins clear, speckle free and unbroken, flesh solid and ripe, with fresh stalks.

# **FLOWER SECTION**

**Flower Exhibits RULES:** Stems used in displays must show flowers only; no seed heads or berries are allowed (except Class 43). Vases can be made from any material, but must be in proportion to the display. No marks are awarded for the vase. No accessories such as bows and additional foliage are allowed. Foliage growing naturally from the flowering stem, and still attached to that stem, is allowed. Packing material (including Oasis) to keep the stems in place is allowed.
